- 3. A focus on interdisciplinary approaches:** The UPSC is increasingly recognizing the value of interdisciplinary approaches to anthropology. This means that candidates should be prepared to answer questions that require them to draw on knowledge from other disciplines, such as sociology, economics, and political science.

Example

Q. Critically examine the anthropological approaches to planning and socio-economic development among the weaker section of the Indian society, highlighting the issues of macro-planning in anthropology. (2020)

Q. How do you situate anthropology in Social Science. (2013)

» **Present Your Content Well Through Diagrams, Flowcharts, Maps, etc.:**

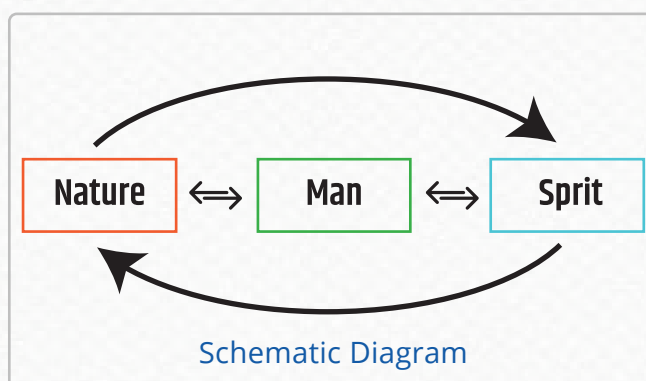
For example, while explaining cultural diffusion, creating a flowchart to illustrate the process of cultural traits spreading from one society to another can enhance the understanding of the concept.

» **Add Value Through Recent Examples, Case Studies, Data, etc.:**

Importance of latest case studies/ examples

Q. Ethnic media and social awareness(10M,2021)



In questions like this use of such unique case studies can be highly rewarding as it helps in clarifying the concept in easy way and shows candidate's awareness about real world issues and solutions.

A. SPECIFIC STRATEGY FOR PAPER-I

The paper can be divided into 3 parts—Archaeology, Socio-cultural anthropology, Physical anthropology.

Broadly, following things should be kept in mind while reading a topic and making notes:

1. Note **scholars and their work**. Eg- Malinowski's "Argonauts of the Western Pacific" 1922. Scholars should be mentioned in introduction, arguments as well as counter-arguments in your answers.
2. Mentioning a Single thinker is often not sufficient. Find **different thinkers** related to a topic. Note down their **different perspectives**. Add perspectives from different schools of anthropology. Eg- Functionalism, Structuralism etc.
3. Find **Examples** and relevant **case studies**. For Example- On topic 'marriage', find example of 'distinct practices' related to marriage among various tribes from world as well as India.
4. Find **good Diagrams** related to different topics.

Important considerations:

Topics such as Anthropological Theories, Archaeology, Fossil, Primates etc are said to be **more scoring**. Get thorough clarity on such topics.

1. "**Anthropological theories**" is backbone for socio-cultural part of syllabus. Understand the theory well in terms of basic idea, scholars and their books/papers, name of tribes they have worked, criticism/limitations of theory etc.
2. For **Physical anthropology**, while certain topics of syllabus are static, few other topics require value addition in sync with contemporary developments related to them. For Eg- For topic "DNA technology in diseases and medicine", contemporary development is 'CRISPER Cas9 technology'. Scope of such value addition is much in chapter on "Applications of Anthropology". Also, diagrams are important in physical anthropology.
3. **Archeology** is largely static in nature. Make good notes and do value addition. For example, if you come across any news on "discovery of new fossils" etc, integrate it in your notes and use in your answers. Also, practice diagrams of tools in archeology, use maps to locate prehistoric sites.
4. For **socio-cultural anthropology**, learn definitions given by scholars, limitations of such definitions, name of their work, examples of societies etc. Find out good case studies on such topics. Also, attempt to understand various anthropological perspectives.

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B. SPECIFIC STRATEGY FOR PAPER-II

Paper-II is broadly divided into 3 parts

Indian prehistory and archaeology

1. Approach is similar to archeology (Paper-I) with some modifications.
2. After finishing a topic, make note under subheadings such as Prevailing Climate, Tools, Tool-types, Tool-technology, Tool material, prominent sites, related archeologists, uniqueness in the sites, etc.
3. Practice the [diagrams of tools](#).
4. Draw [India's map](#) and locate the archeological sites in all your answers.

Indian anthropology

1. This part is [dynamic](#). Eg- Impact of globalization on Indian villages was asked in 2022.
2. Note the name of anthropologists, their work and their basic findings.
3. Mention the [contemporary relevance](#) of topics such as caste system, caste mobility, tribe-caste continuum etc. Mention the [dynamism](#) i.e., how these themes (Eg- caste system etc) have transformed themselves up to the present times.
4. From newspapers, if you come across any [case studies](#) on such dynamic topics, note them to use in your answers. Examples of such dynamic topics are- "Impact of Hinduism, Buddhism, Christianity, Islam and other religions on tribal societies", "Ethnic conflicts and political developments", "Future of caste system" etc.
5. Contribution of [important Indian anthropologists](#) is often asked. Eg- S.C. Dube, Irawati Karwe were asked in 2022. Remember their important works (books/papers), societies they studied, key observations and conclusions etc.

Tribal anthropology

1. A few questions in this part are [problem oriented](#). Eg- Issues of tribal agricultural labourers, issues and solutions related to SC & ST in India was asked in 2022. Adding [relevant statistics in your answer to substantiate the extent of problem](#) or success of an intervention etc would add value to your answer.
2. [XAXA committee](#) report is important to understand tribal problems. Other reports such as one by [Dr. Abhay Bang committee](#) report on tribal health is important too. Use specific XAXA committee recommendations to tribal problems and build on it further from other sources. Use this content to enrich your answers.
3. [Regional specificities of tribals](#) are also sometimes asked. Eg- Comparison between tribals of North East and central India.
4. Note down [Government schemes](#) for the benefits of tribals, Primitive Tribal Groups etc
5. Use [internet and other sources](#) to find good case studies. [Find recent data and statistics related to topics](#). Eg- From Ministry of Tribal Affairs (MoTA) Report, Economic and Political Weekly, Down to Earth, Newspapers etc.

C. NOTE MAKING

Key points for effective NOTE making

1. **Comprehensive & Lean:** Create detailed notes covering important anthropologists' names and their significant works. After understanding the entire syllabus, add value to your notes with additional insights.
2. **Source Consolidation:** Note down content from different sources in one place to avoid scattered information. Compile and organize your notes for easy reference.
3. **Value Addition Techniques:** Enhance notes with well-labelled diagrams, case studies, and innovative content presentation methods to make learning engaging and effective.
4. **Interconnections:** Develop links between different topics in your notes to grasp the subject holistically, improving your understanding and analytical abilities.

Remember, relying solely on topper's notes or ready-made materials may not provide a deep understanding. Embrace the process of note-making as a critical part of your preparation, fostering deeper comprehension and preparing you for the UPSC Anthropology exam with expertise. 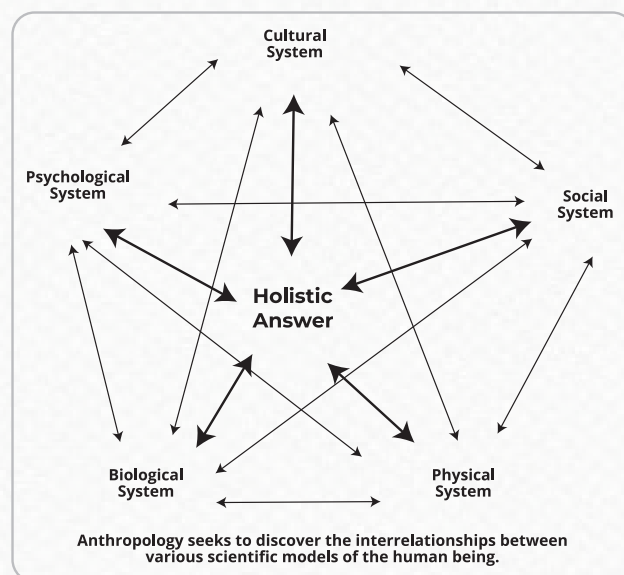
D. REVISION

1. Revise your notes **periodically**. Keeping notes lean help here. You can also make short hand notes for each topic during revision, it will help in quick revision before the exam.
2. **Practice diagrams**. Try to draw them neatly in fast manner.

6. Answer Writing Practice

Answer writing practice is very important.

- ▶ Unlike GS answers, answers in anthropology require scholarly flavor. Write your answers like a scholar/anthropologist. Cite scholars and their work in answers.
- ▶ Try to make your **answers stand apart**. Add aspects such as **application of concept, case study, good example, diagram, flowchart, scholars and their work, anthropological theories, interconnection of topics, contemporary relevance, current affairs, etc.** Innovate on these and make it a habit to incorporate uniqueness in your answers.
- ▶ Anthropology is **by and large a static subject** where current affairs forms only 10-15% i.e., around 85-90 % of the syllabus is static, hence previous year question practice forms an integral part of preparation.
- ▶ Add **specificity** in your answers. Eg- Rather than mentioning that tribals suffer ill health, mention which specific tribe has which specific health problem. Mention reasons behind it and substantiate it with specific data etc.
- ▶ Try to **present content using innovative means** such as flowcharts, shapes etc.
- ▶ Have good command **over PYQs and practice** them thoroughly. Topics often get repeated.



Answers should reflect interdisciplinary approach to fetch very high marks

Pointers for Effective Answer Writing Practice

- ▶ Try to attempt all the questions. Practicing time management is very necessary.
- ▶ Attempt initial questions of paper well. This creates a rapo in the mind of examiner for your evaluation.
- ▶ Use 5 minutes for choosing questions out of options.
- ▶ In general, use 14min for a 20 marker, 10 min for a 15 marker and 7 min for a 10 marker.



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7. Mock Tests and Analysis

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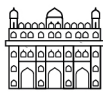
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
